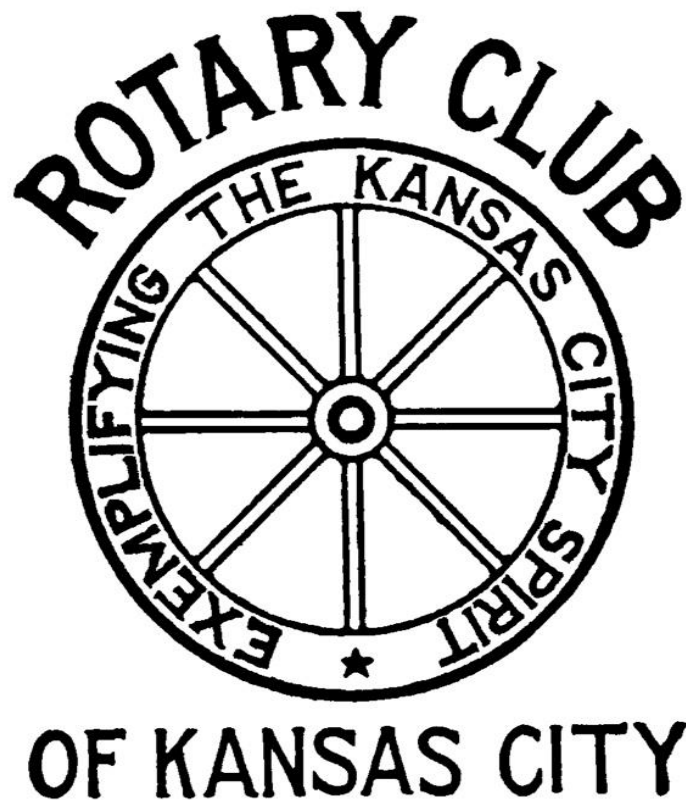

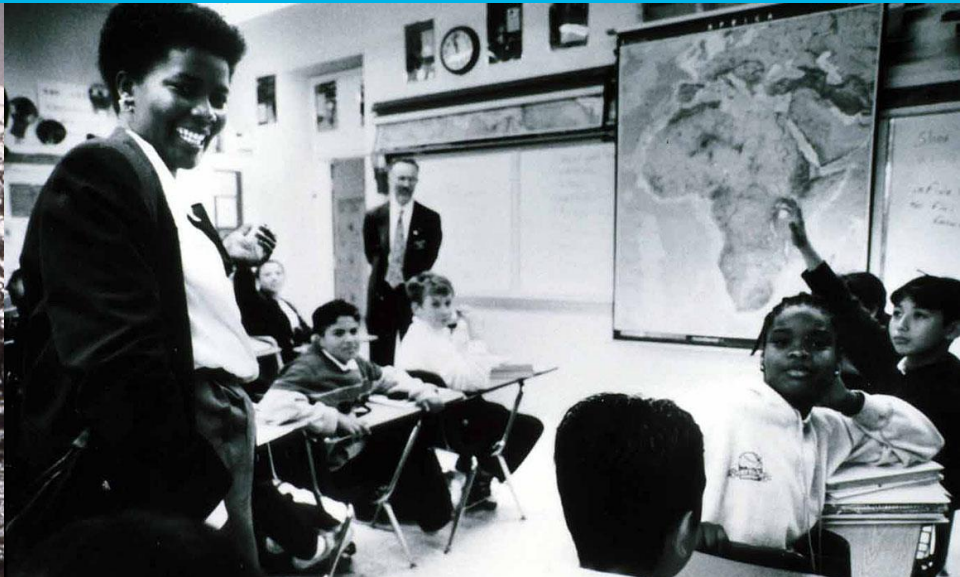

# FØRSTE PROGRAM: STIPEND PÅ UNIVERSITETSNIVÅ — 1947

## Paul Harris FELLOWS

THESE YOUNG MEN face a great year! They hold Fellowships for Advanced Study, honoring the memory of Rotary's late Founder. Stipends range from \$1,900 to \$2,900 and are from the Paul Harris Memorial Fund of the Rotary Foundation. Winners were selected after screening of candidates in Districts.



**EVERETT T. ALCAN**

"To be an intelligent citizen, I should understand and appreciate our European neighbors." That is why Mr. Alcan, of Beloit, Wisconsin, wishes to study at an English or Swiss university. A graduate of Beloit College, he headed that school's science department last year. Twice president of his class, he won outstanding social, scholastic, and athletic honors.



**JEFFERY HEATON ALDAM**

This young Englishman will study U. S. history when he enters Harvard University this Fall. Graduate of Cambridge University, Heades history courses will fit him for post in foreign office of trading concern. Treasurer of Trinity College Historical Society. Served with distinction during D-Day assault. Wounded during invasion of Normandy.



**WILLIAM PIERSON BARKER**

Preparation for a ministerial career is sought by this Ohioan. He has a B.A. degree from Haverford College in Pennsylvania. There he was active in debating, radio, journalism, student council, music, religious work, and varsity sports. Wishes to attend New College in Scotland or Cambridge in England. "A year abroad will aid me greatly," he says.



**STEPHEN DAVID BECKER**

China's politics interest this Yonkers, New York, student, so he plans to study at Yenching University in Peiping, China. Familiar with the Chinese, Japanese, and Spanish languages, he graduated from Harvard University in 1947. His year in China will be fulfillment of program begun in college. Activities included student council, dramatics, football.



**STEWART COLE BLASIER**

A career in foreign affairs is one reason why this Michigan man (Grosse Pointe) wishes to study at the University of Chile in Santiago. At George Washington University he studied Latin America's history, government, and economics. Speaks French and Spanish. Was U. S. Navy Task Group Supply Officer. Student leader at University of Illinois.



**ROBERT EMIL BOIES**

This Wethersfield, Connecticut, student will spend a year at Charles University in Czechoslovakia. Served with U. S. Marine Corps in Pacific. Purple Heart and Bronze Star Medals. One of U. S. delegation to observe 1946 Creek elections. Yale University graduate. Phi Beta Kappa. Student council. Previously won three scholarships, one fellowship.



**LEON TOLLIVER BOSWELL, Jr.**

To further a trade career with Latin-Americans, this Texan (San Benito) will study at the University of La Plata, Argentina. He speaks, writes, and reads Spanish. Graduated with honors from University of Texas as bachelor of business administration. With U. S. Navy in Pacific. Discharged with Lt. (jg) rating. State finalist in high-school debate in 1939.



**JACK IRELAND BOYD**

This Monticello, Arkansas, man seeks a career in the U. S. Department of State's foreign service. At the University of Geneva (Switzerland) he will study international relations. Was wartime weather observer in Greenland. Graduate of Arkansas A. & M. College. Second in class. Graduate student in international relations at University of Chicago.



**JACK EDSON CRESSMAN**

As pilot of a B-25 bomber, this Fairbury, Nebraska, student saw part of Europe from the air. That whetted his desire to seek new viewpoints to acquaint himself with world situations. At McGill University in Canada he will be studying for a journalism background. A graduate of the University of Nebraska, he wants to be a writer of "critical appraisalment."



**AUBREY GOLDSMITH DAVIES**

To prepare for teaching of English literature, this New Haven, Connecticut, resident will study at Cambridge University, England. He finished in 1944 at Yale University, where he also did graduate work. During war years he was a member of the American Field Service with the British Army in Burma. Winner of three scholarships.



**RENAN G. DOMINGUEZ**

This native son of Mérida, Mexico, is no stranger to the United States, where he will spend a year at the University of Illinois. Part of his education was secured at Bradley Polytechnic Institute in Illinois and at the University of Illinois. He will continue his studies in civil engineering, specializing in construction. He speaks, writes, reads Spanish and English.



**JACQUES PIERRE DUCHAMP**

To help fill in the "dangerous ditch" between nations caused by prejudices and ignorance is the goal of this young Frenchman. Choice of schools: University of Michigan. Reason: Excellence of school and opportunity to visit numerous factories in that section. Course: Aeronautical engineering. Background: Education at University of Lyon, France.



**RICHARD HOMER HADLEY**

Europe's complex political and economic setup interests Mr. Hadley so keenly he will study economics and history at Cambridge, England, or Paris, France. Won B.S. degrees in civil and mechanical engineering at University of Washington. Was pilot in U. S. Army Air Corps. Sports: Skiing, football, mountain climbing. High-school valedictorian in Seattle.



**JAY STAPP JOHNSON**

This Middletown, Ohio, man is preparing for the Christian ministry. His first choice is the American University in Beirut, Syria; second is the American School of Oriental Research in Jerusalem. Background includes study at Oberlin College and Yale Divinity School. Treasurer of student body at seminary. Active in forensics, student politics, athletics.



**VATCHE KALBIAN**

Study of heart diseases, preferably in an English college and hospital, is the aim of this native Palestinian. A four-language linguist—English, Arabic, Armenian, and French—he is now a doctor at the Government hospital in Nablus, Palestine. Served on faculty at the American University of Beirut in Syria. Outside activities: tennis, swimming, football, piano.



**ANDRE MECHELYNCK**

To learn more about metallurgy, this Belgian plans to study at famed M.I.T. (Massachusetts Institute of Technology). He graduated from the Free University of Brussels this year. An expert fencer, he also plays a fast game of hockey. His *Reform of Higher Education* was published in January as a University of Brussels book. He reads four languages.



**SEYMOUR MENDELSON**

Already winner of a fellowship and a four-year scholarship, this Reading, Pennsylvania, man plans to study at the University of London or the University of Geneva. His field of study is international politics. His 26 months of overseas service in Italy and North Africa provide background for studies. Set new fraternity mark in debate and oratory.



**PETER MANNING SMITH**

Training at Harvard University's School of Business Administration is the desire of this Englishman. He studied at Ellesmere College and since 1940 has been employed by Rolls-Royce, Ltd. "I want to reach an advanced stage in the knowledge of business through study of U. S. methods and practices and become an economic and industrial consultant."



**CARL CHING-TE WU**

Native of Tientsin, China. Educated in China and United States (Cornell University and University of Michigan). Candidate for doctorate degree. Holds Department of State scholarship. Interested in machinability and physics of metals. Frequently addresses large gatherings. Prefers Graduate School at University of Michigan.

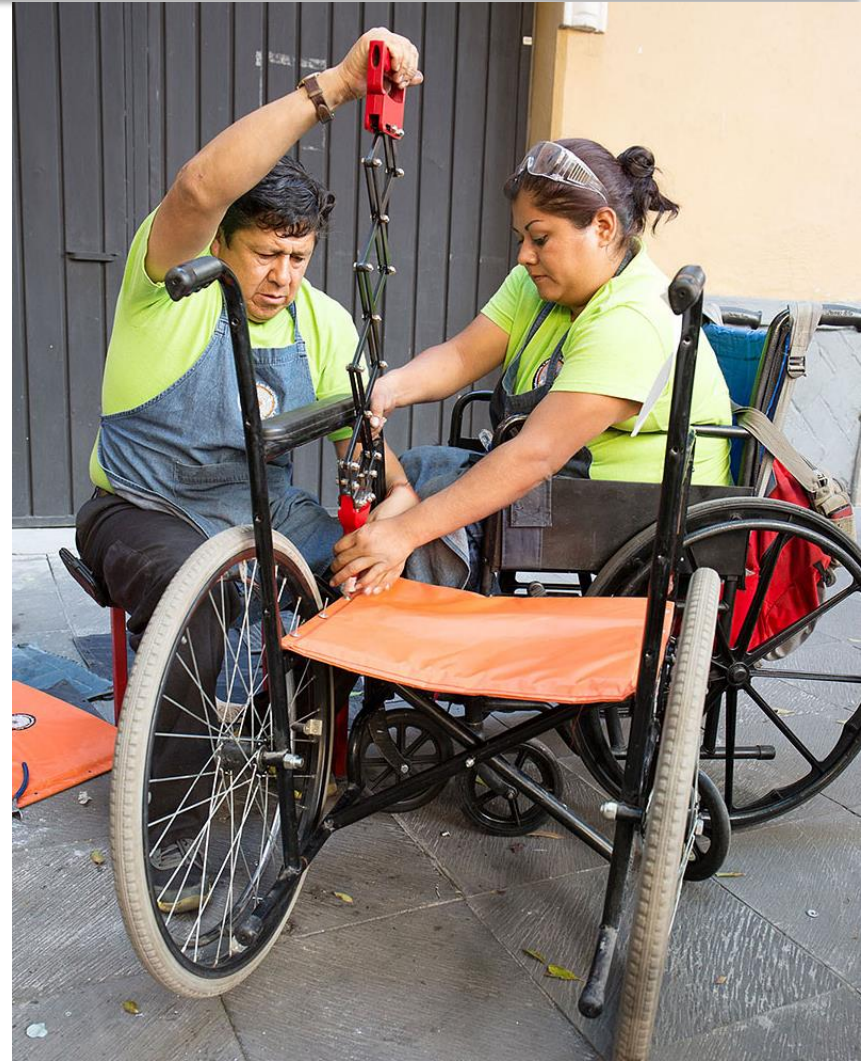






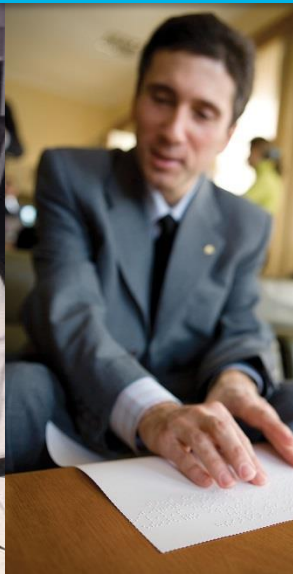

## ROTARY SERVING HUMANITY

Rotary has been many things, to many people, in the last 111 years. Through Rotary, our members have found friends, community, and a sense of purpose; we've forged connections, advanced our careers, and had incredible experiences we couldn't have had anywhere else. Every week, in more than 34,000 clubs around the world, Rotarians come together to talk, laugh, and share ideas. But above all, we come together for one, overriding goal: service.

Service to humanity has been the cornerstone of Rotary since its earliest days, and has been its main purpose ever since. I believe that there is no better path to meaningful service today than Rotary membership; and no organization better placed to make a real and positive difference in our world. No other organization so effectively brings together committed, capable professionals in a wide variety of fields, and enables them to achieve ambitious goals. Through Rotary, we have the capacity, the network, and the knowledge to change the world: the only limits are the ones we place on ourselves.

Today, our organization is at a critical point: a historic juncture that will determine, in so many ways, what comes next. Together, we have provided extraordinary service to our world; tomorrow, our world will depend on us to do even more. Now is the time to capitalize on our success: as we complete the eradication of polio, and catapult Rotary forward, with determination and enthusiasm, to be an even greater force for good in the world.

Of the many lessons polio eradication has taught us, one of the most important is also one of the simplest: that if we want to bring all of Rotary forward, we've all got to be moving in the same direction. Continuity of leadership, at the club, district, and RI level, is the only way we will flourish, and achieve our full potential. It is not enough simply to bring in new members and form new clubs: our goal is not more Rotarians, but more Rotarians who can achieve more good Rotary work, and will become the Rotary leaders of tomorrow.

Near the end of his life, reflecting on the path that brought him to Rotary, Paul Harris wrote: "Individual effort may be turned to individual needs, but combined effort should be dedicated to the service of mankind. The power of combined effort knows no limitation." He could hardly have imagined then that one day, more than 1.2 million Rotarians would be combining their efforts, and, through our Rotary Foundation, their resources, to serve humanity together. And we can only imagine what great deeds Paul Harris would have expected of such a Rotary! It is our responsibility to achieve those deeds; as it is our privilege to carry forth the tradition of *Rotary Serving Humanity*.

## HOW TO QUALIFY

To qualify for the Presidential Citation, clubs must complete two mandatory activities and additional activities in several categories. Most activities will be verified automatically through RI's data. But some will be verified only by the information you enter in Rotary Club Central.

To more accurately capture your club's achievements, for the first time ever, clubs will have the entire Rotary year — from 1 July 2016 to 30 June 2017 — to achieve the Presidential Citation goals.

District governors will be able to track the progress of all of their clubs online, and I'm asking them to follow up with you regularly and support you in achieving these goals

## DISTRICT CITATION

I will also offer a special citation to districts that:

- Have at least 51 percent of clubs earn the Presidential Citation
- Contribute at least 20 percent of their District Designated Fund to PolioPlus
- Increase Annual Fund giving by 5 percent over last year's total
- Achieve a 3 percent increase in membership
